


Vermont's Food Scrap Ban Takes Effect

How did we get here?

Vermont State Diversion Goal



2018 Waste Composition Study




An estimated 20% of trash is food and food scraps (~77,000 tons/year).

Roughly half is residential.

If every Vermonter composted their food waste it would be the same as taking over 9,500 vehicles off the road each year.



States with varying Organics Bans





July 1, 2020 – Vermont state law now bans disposal of food scraps from both the trash and in landfills.


5.5.1.2 The owner of any dwelling or rooming house shall provide and maintain appropriate receptacles for the removal of trash, recyclables, and food scraps in accordance with 10 V.S.A. ch. 159.

5.5.2.1 The owner of any dwelling or rooming house shall assure that arrangements are made for the removal of trash, recyclables, and food scraps in accordance with 10 V.S.A. ch. 159.



July 1, 2020 – Haulers of trash are required to offer food scrap collection to commercial customers & apartments of 4 units or more unless another hauler is willing to provide the service.

Bag-drop haulers are already required to offer food scrap collection

~2 dozen compost facilities


And over...100

Single Use Products Law took effect July 1, 2020

Prohibits stores from providing:

- Single use plastic bags (10¢ for paper bags OK)
- Expanded polystyrene food/drink

containers

- Plastic straws
- Plastic stirrers
- *Note this is not a landfill ban
